

In case you're wondering, the point of the visits are to establish a parishioner/pastor relationship and for each of us to get to know one another more in-depth. In a place where nearly everyone is from a different part of the country, I think it is good for you and I to get to know one another. I've been surprised as to how close some of our paths have come to directly crossing.

I'm not going to say, "I'm not your ordinary pastor." However, in getting to know me and even Lisa more personally you will know that I do not want, nor have never desired to be a pastor. This is God's doing. He has been calling me into the ministry since I was 14 years of age, but I did everything to

ignore His call. Even during my sinful, independent living years, He kept calling, but I kept ignoring. When I was finally worn out, not just from running away from God, but also from guilt and shame, He opened up doors for me and my family that have been beyond my wildest dreams. God's word is true, "Everything is possible with God."

Interestingly, even after confessing my sins and hearing the Gospel message that I am saved by God's grace through faith in Jesus, I have never considered myself worthy to be an under-shepherd to the Chief Shepherd. All I really wanted to do was be a faithful husband, a loving father, and the best memorial granite cutter in the Chicago area. I don't think there was anything wrong with wanting to be and do any of those things. I was truly content. But no, God had His plan and purpose for me and my family.

When entering the seminary 10 years ago I had no idea what to expect. I went with one book underneath my arm, the Bible. But, before leaving a Lutheran pastor told me that he hoped the seminary would make me a Lutheran. I believe the seminary was successful. Although I have Roman Catholic roots, I have no desire to go back because it was in the Lutheran Church where I heard the saving Gospel message; that Jesus died for all my sins and that heaven is for me.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT MINISTRY GRANT - - \$30,000





CHRISTIAN SUPPORT GROUP

The Support Group meets on the last Thursday of the month at 10:00 am in the Quiet Room off the Narthex of the Church.

The Lesson for the March 31st meeting was from Ephesians 2:8-10: for it is by grace you have been saved.

Through faith – and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God – not by works, so that no one can boast. For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

The members discussed Palm Sunday, Jesus' entrance into the city of Jerusalem for the Passover. Maundy Thursday and the Last Supper when Jesus met with his disciples in the upper room, Good Friday and the death on the cross for our sins, and Easter in celebration of Christ's resurrection.

From the first sunrise at the International Date Line, Christians are singing "Alleluia, Hosanna to Christ the

Lord". This continues to ring out from Christians in all countries around the world.

Easter was originally observed on the day following the end of the Passover fast (14 Nisan), regardless of the day of the week. Currently Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday after the first full moon following the vernal equinox

The symbols of Easter: Eggs: a symbol of new life – of the tomb in which Jesus was laid, the Easter Lily because they are shaped like trumpets, and are a symbol of immortality, Butterfly with its life cycle of as a symbol of eternal life. (While in the cocoon, it undergoes a metamorphosis and emerges in a new and beautiful form), the lamb, a symbol associated with Jesus. He is often referred to in the Bible as the "Lamb of God". John the Baptist described Jesus as the "Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world". The Passover lamb has been interpreted by Christians as foreshadowing Jesus' sacrificial death. The cross is a symbol of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection

The dogwood – the dogwood was the tree chosen to construct the Cross. The bloom speaks in the shape of a cross with holes in the tips of the petals signifying the nails that were driven into the Cross. If you look closely at these holes you can notice a faint red stain representing the Blood. In the center you will find a green bloom symbolizing the crown of thorns placed on the head of Jesus and the Jelly Beans, JELLY BEANS: BLACK is the sins of man, for which our Savior died,

RED is the blood he shed, when he was crucified, WHITE is for atonement, he redeemed us from death and sin, GREEN is our new life in Christ, as in baptism did begin, PINK is for the hope, that we live according to his way, ORANGE is the Holy Spirit, that fills our heart we pray, PURPLE is for royalty, for Jesus is the King of Kings and YELLOW is for celebration, and the joy Easter morning brings.

ribs, macaroni and cheese, baked beans, coleslaw, chips and a warm brownie with fudge sauce. We had 44 golfers and we thank them all for their support.



STEWARDSHIP

GRATITUDE FOR GOD'S BLESSINGS

In the month of May in many parts of our country the fields, gardens and orchards are green and growing, giving us the promise that seedtime and harvest will again prevail, and with God's blessing the earth will yield its increase and provide food for all God's creatures. According to God's design the sun will warm the fertile soil, the rains will cause the seeds to sprout and grow into healthy, productive plants, vines, trees and bushes. Last month's newsletter article had the title of "*April showers bring May flowers.*" We are now seeing evidence that this old saying is true.

In May we will also be celebrating two special church year events: Ascension Day on May 14 and Pentecost Day on May 23. These two very important events help to encourage and empower us as God's stewards. On Ascension Day our Lord returned to the right hand of the Father, not to escape from the world, but rather to serve as our Advocate to the Father. It is so encouraging for us to know that Jesus is at the right hand of the Father pleading for the forgiveness of our sins which results in fresh starts for us as God's stewards. At the price of His own life Jesus earned for us the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation. His resurrection was proof positive that the Father accepted His suffering and death on the cross as the perfect and complete sacrifice, and

His ascension provided proof positive that just as He came from heaven to be our Savior so He returned to heaven to rule all things for the sake of His church—that is, the sake of us—His stewards.

Pentecost Day reminds us of when the Holy Spirit descended upon the first apostles and empowered them to be renewed servants of Jesus who became bold and effective witnesses of the good news of salvation in Christ Jesus. Pentecost Day also reminds us of the new birth of faith in us through the marvelous, yet mysterious, working of the Holy Spirit. For most of us that started with our baptisms. That new life continues as the Holy Spirit works through His Word and the sacrament of Holy Communion to strengthen and equip us to be effective stewards. As God's stewards we have the promise that the Holy Spirit empowers us to do what we otherwise could not do.

The seventh Biblical Stewardship Principle states that "*God's stewards are served and serving.*" This means that "*God's stewards recognize that their stewardship involves a Gospel-powered style of life which is demonstrated in servanthood within all the arenas of life.*" By the grace of God we are reminded that we are to serve our Lord with personal acts of compassion and service as well as financial gifts. Some people seem inclined to think that stewardship is just about money. Yes, it is about money and

how we manage it, but that is only the tip of the iceberg. Stewardship involves our wise management and use of all of life and life's resources for God's purposes.

What a blessing and encouragement it is to know and believe that Christ died for us, rose again from the dead, ascended into heaven as the divine conqueror of sin, death and the devil, and now sends His Holy Spirit to be the Lord and Giver of life. May the Holy Spirit enable us to use our time, talents, relationships, treasure and all the other special gifts and blessings in a way that honors our God and blesses our neighbors.

STEPHEN MINISTRY

DEPRESSION

As God's people we all will have one or more crisis in our lives. Some crisis can include depression, such as, hospitalization, terminal illness, loss of loved one, loss of job, divorce, move to a nursing home, move to a new community or church, retirement, faith struggles and many more. There are three types of depression: Mild which is the most common and can be brought on by happy and sad events. A wedding is happy but stressful and the stress can lead to depression. Moderate depression is a feeling of hopelessness, it lasts longer and is more intense. Moderate depression is often brought on by sad events, such as death of a loved one or loss of job. Usually the person continues to function in their daily life but it can become severe. When depression becomes severe it can cause the person to lose interest in the outside world and physical changes can occur. A severely depressed person always requires professional treatment. The only way you can help a severely depressed person is by helping them to find professional

care. When conversing with a mildly or moderately depressed person always be patient. Their responses may be slow and repetitive. It is difficult for them to make a decision. Always be accepting because there may be other people who find the depressed person difficult to be around and may avoid their company. Let them know that you understand their pain by expressing caring statements, " Life is sometimes very difficult ", " It's okay to feel depressed at times." Initiate conversation because the person may be quite passive. Encourage expression of feelings because at this time they may be having difficulty expressing their feelings. Give positive encouragement when the person makes any kind of feelings statement. They may express feelings by crying. Even if they don't cry urge them to do so. Often the depressed person is angry which they need to talk about. You might say " I sense you're angry about _____. I'd like to hear about it." Don't try to humor the person to help them snap out of it. This does not work and it is not showing empathy. Sometimes the person has self defeating behavior. They may make an impulsive

decision that they will deeply regret at a later time. Offer an opinion or make a suggestion to delay the impulsive decision. Since hopelessness is the main characteristic of depression it is important to instill hope. Recognize and affirm small improvements that the person has made. This helps them to see God in their life and realize change is possible. Use Christian assurances, such as, Bible verses (Romans 8:31-39, Isaiah 40:28-31, Psalm 42:1-6a, Romans 5:1-6), Bible stories, prayer, and blessing. This is a brief overview of caring for a depressed person. We can help each other as a Christian family by recognizing the trying times each one of us has in our lives and caring for each other in a Christian manner. God is always the cure giver. He sends His Holy Spirit to work through us so we are the care giver and "Yes" we all are care givers. " *Weeping may linger for the night, but joy comes with the morning*". - Psalm 30:5b
