AGAIN, AND AGAIN, AND AGAIN...

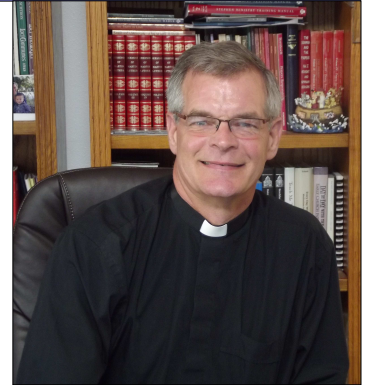
As many of you know, our grandson, Isaac is spending a great deal of time with Aga (Lisa) and Paw-Paw (me). Whenever I find myself doing something fun with him, that is, something he likes to do or have done to him, once the activity stops he will respond and say, "Again." This will go on for a long time; again, and again, and again. If I weren't so old, the obviously fun activity would go on for hours. Thanks for rescuing me Aga.

Some activities may not give the appearance of fun, but in them there is a great benefit received. Before every meal, we say prayers. Isaac will try to do what we do (make the sign of the holy cross and fold hands), and try to say what we say (the prayer before meals). The one part of the prayer he says well is "Amen." Our daily prayers are the things we do again, and again, and again. On Sundays, in the Divine Service you can almost hear Isaac say his "Amen."

The liturgy of the Divine Service is drawn from the Bible and it has been composed in a way that reflects the faith of the one holy Christian and apostolic Church. It is the Bible believed and understood correctly. The liturgy teaches us these things, and it does so by exposing us to these truths every week again, and again, and again. There is an old saying that "repetition is the mother of learning." The repetition of hearing and singing the words of the liturgy each week teaches us the Christian and apostolic faith, and shapes and forms the way we think about the faith. This is a process that begins with the smallest child and continues all throughout our life. It is not a process that ever ends or is finished because the words and phrases, the movements and actions of the liturgy invite an ever deeper understanding as we grow and mature as Christians.

The noted Lutheran church music historian and musician Carl Schalk who taught at Concordia University, Chicago has the following insightful reflections on this topic in his wonderful little book, *First Person Singular: Reflections on Worship, Liturgy and Children* (St. Louis: Morningstar Music Publishers, 1998, 13-14):

"Tell me again," children say, as we repeat a familiar story for the hundredth time, "Tell me again!" Some stories they know so well that they can say them right along with us. Changing even a word or two brings the instant response, "That's not how it goes."



How do children learn to throw a ball, to jump rope, to tie a knot? Repetition! Not mindless repetition, to be sure, but repetition which ultimately releases them from concentration on the mechanics and frees them to focus on the joy of doing whatever it is they are doing.

How do children learn to ride a bicycle? They learn by practicing over and over, again and again. Then suddenly – it all falls into place. They are riding! No longer consciously thinking about pumping their legs, keeping their balance, or watching where they are going, all at once it has come together – and they are riding! Free to enjoy the experience without thinking about the individual actions that make it possible.

This is how all of us – children and adults alike – learn to worship. Worship is best when the actions of worship are second nature, when we don't have to consciously be asking ourselves, "What do we do next?" As long as we are thinking, "What comes next?" or "Do we stand or sit or kneel" we are not necessarily worshipping. We are still learning to worship.

But what would happen if a child who has learned to move the pedals clockwise, suddenly encounters a bicycle where the pedals work counter-clockwise? Confusion and frustration would set in, not to mention the prospect of having to learn all over again how to ride that new bicycle. Which hand do you use to brush your teeth? Try

I want to wish all the Mothers of our wonderful congregation a blessed and Happy Mother's Day. May this day be as special to you as you are to your children.

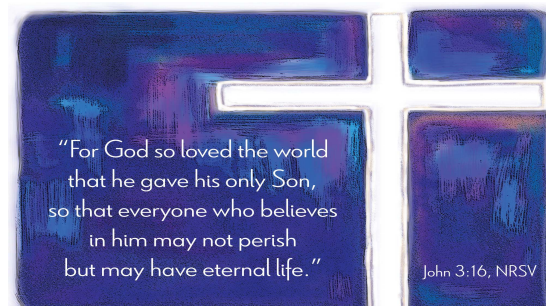

using the other hand and see how uncomfortable it is. That is why the Church wisely uses the same basic forms and the same wording in its worship again and again. Once learned, they become the stable structure which both children and adults are set free to concentrate on what they are doing, saying, and singing.

When children – or adults – have learned that their response to the Kyrie bids is “Lord, have mercy,” or that they answer the petitions of the Prayer of the Church with “Hear our prayer,” they participate with confidence. When children – or adults – are confronted each Sunday with new and different forms, there is bound to be confusion and frustration. They may even feel uncomfortable, like you trying to brush your teeth with the opposite hand. Children – or adults – don’t know what to say or do, or whether they should stand, sit, or kneel. In the attempt to fashion liturgies that seem to adults to be more “interesting” or “meaningful,” we often place a significant stumbling block in the way of truly meaningful worship.

Children – and adults as well – need a structure for worship which is stable and unchanging. Many so-called “creative” liturgies only foster confusion and frustration by constantly changing what we do and how we do it.

What some promote as the way to greater participation in worship usually serves only to diminish or silence participation altogether. Even worse, they stop attending worship service altogether.

So let’s give three cheers for doing Divine Service in the same way week after week. Such repetition, week after week actually provides a structure which both children and adults are set free to give full attention to the content of the liturgy, and to catch its fuller impact, significance, meaning, and let’s not forget the benefit. Worship was never intended to be fun, like playing a game with a grandchild. Rather, worship is intended to receive the benefits which come to us from a loving heavenly Father through His Son Jesus Christ: forgiveness, life, and salvation – strength and comfort for today and the hope of eternal life tomorrow.

“Tell me a story,” children say. In the liturgy of the Church, in the Divine Service we do – the most important story they will ever hear or learn: the story of God’s love for them through the life, suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. And we tell the story in the same way – again, and again, and again.

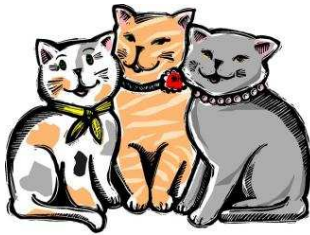


BOARD OF COMMUNITY & PARISH FELLOWSHIP

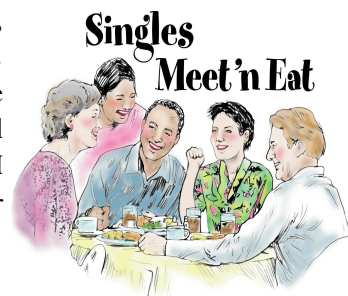

STEPHEN MINSITRY

The Call To Care, Cont.

Caring is expressing good intentions through loving, appropriate deeds. You can bring hope and encouragement to someone suffering through your loving deeds.

There are practical principles to aid you in caring effectively. This month we will begin with the first of the six caring actions.

You can write a personal note. Send a store bought card with some personal writing. Write a note on stationary or a blank card. Focus on the suffering person and their crisis. They may not feel very cared for if you write about news going on with the acquaintances you both know. Helpful messages may begin with---I'm sorry to hear about your--- You have been on my mind---This must be difficult---It hurts to know that you are going through this---My heart goes out to you--- _____ told me about your setback.

As you are writing imagine the other person is right there with you. Write with your heart and not just your head. Pour out your emotions to the individual. Let your message express how you feel inside when thinking about the person in crisis.

"Encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing." - 1 Thessalonians 5:11

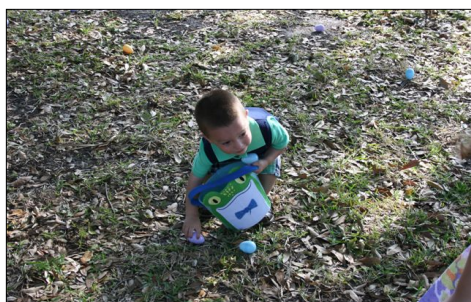


CHILDREN'S ANNUAL EASTER EGG HUNT

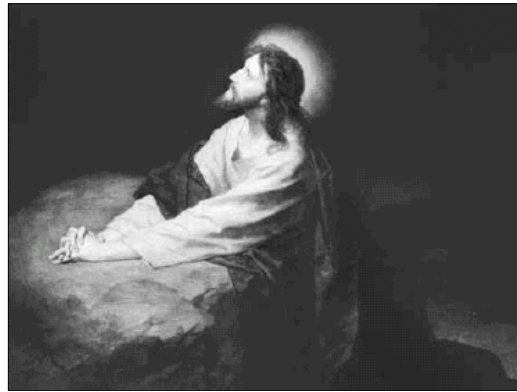


STEWARDSHIP

"Reaping What You Sow"

In 2 Corinthians 9:6 (NIV) St. Paul wrote: "Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously." In many parts of our country during this month of May gardens will be turning green as new plants spring from the ground and begin the process of producing fruits, vegetables and flowers. If you have ever planted hills of seeds, like beans or cucumbers, you probably know how true these words of St. Paul are. Plant only one or perhaps two seeds in each hill and you will not have the same results that you would have if you had planted four or more seeds in each hill. Of course, St. Paul was not writing about gardening but rather about a special offering to help the saints in Jerusalem and Judea who were suffering from a severe famine. Some may take this passage to mean that it is our motivation for giving. Those folks might even be so bold as to say that if you are stingy in your giving, you will be poorer for it, but if you are generous in your giving you will be even wealthier. But this verse does not state the motivation for giving but simply refers to information and instruction that we know to be true from experience and observation.

The true motivation for Christian giving is found in 2 Corinthians 9:8 (NIV): "And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work." God's grace in Jesus Christ is the motivation for



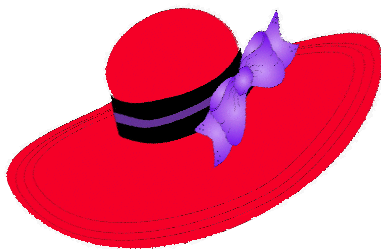
our Christian giving. Jesus has done for us what we could never do for ourselves, that is, save us from sin, death and everlasting condemnation. Our spiritual needs are fully taken care of in Christ, but what about our physical needs? This passage speaks to that as well when it indicates that God also takes care of our physical needs so that in all things at all times we will have all that we need so that we can abound in every good work.

St. Paul stated this so eloquently in Romans 8:32 (NIV): "He (God) who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all—will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things? This question begs for the answer "yes." God does provide all that we need for our spiritual and physical welfare and he does it lavishly so that we can abound in every good work.

Finally St. Paul brought the truth of Christian giving home when he wrote in 2 Corinthians 9:7 (NIV): "Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful (hilarious) giver." Christian giving is primarily a spiritual issue, not a financial one. When we children of God answer the question of what do I believe God is calling me to give then we respond freely and generously not because the church or any other Christian cause needs our money, but because we believe in our hearts that our giving is a consecrated response. The joy that we reap from such free and generous giving is something that brings a special sweetness to our lives that no one can ever take away from us.

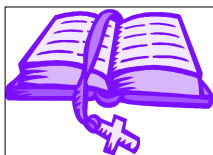
